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Miller Performing Arts: Pull Back the Curtain 2018 Sharing Performance

An Original Theatre Performance and Scripted Readings by Hong Kong's Best Young Playwrights



(Hong Kong – 12 September 2018) Hong Kong Youth Arts Foundation (HKYAF) proudly announces the return of *Pull Back the Curtain*, this year with brand new scripts written by Eloise Oliver, Rae Lee and Yasmin Subba Hingun as part of our *Pull Back the Curtain 2018* youth scriptwriting programme.

Now in its fifth edition, *Pull Back the Curtain* has seen four years of full-house performances. For this year's sharing programme, HKYAF is delighted to present the youth production *Healed*, written by 17-year-old Eloise Oliver and transformed into a professional physical theatre production directed by Lindsey McAlister and Eimear Mimi Burns. The programme also includes staged readings of *A Cup of Coffee*, written by 17-year-old Rae Lee, and *In the Fishbowl*, by 22-year-old Yasmin Subba Hingun.

Pull Back the Curtain is a three-month-long youth scriptwriting initiative led by professional theatre director and playwright Clare Stearns. In a series of five workshops, twenty-four aspiring playwrights from a range of local and international schools and university backgrounds came

together to experiment with ideas and work on their writing skills. The workshops focused on developing and articulating new concepts, exploring experiences from everyday life, and examining local and international social topics through writing and theatre performance. Three resulting scripts were selected for presentation. One as a full production, two as scripted readings.

Selected for full production, Eloise Oliver's script *Healed* opens up the intimate world of a young female performer who struggles with insecurities about her chosen profession. The story weaves between her off stage and on stage lives, her internal conflicts and vulnerability. A powerful story of the conflict of wanting to be on stage but the dilemma of fearing judgement and rejection from her audience and mother. Oliver's writing process involved gathering materials from her research in psychology and ideas around her character before scripting.

Rae Lee's *A Cup of Coffee* was inspired by a classroom discussion about school shootings in the US. Drawing on the traumatic ordeal of the victims' families, *A Cup of Coffee* uses a series of fragmented dialogues to capture the experience of a mother whose daughter dies in a school shooting incident. Lee's script incorporates the perspectives of the characters entwined with pre-recorded voice materials, adding touches of humour between the lines as a deadly serious topic unfolds.

With *In the Fishbowl*, Yasmin Subba Hingun draws an unlikely but fitting parallel between the lives of two goldfish and the daily struggles of people in Hong Kong faced with compact environments. Charged with humour and incorporating classic tunes from the 1970s, the production tackles the effects of a lack of space to live and dream with a positive message about how to live a happy life and make the most of what we have.

Originally inspired by the *New Views* youth writing programme at London's National Theatre, *Pull Back the Curtain* does more than just nurture an interest in scriptwriting. Workshop Director Clare Stearns said, "Through scriptwriting and theatre performance, participants can explore historical, social and personal events so as to make sense of the world around them."
